Bill of Rights Forum: Working Group on Criminal Justice and V ictims Rights

Dear Group Members,

Coiste na nIarchimí (Coiste) is the national umbrel la organization for republi can exprisoner groups. Since Coiste was founded in 19—98 it has built up relations with a wide range of groups including those involved in the victims sector. More recently Coiste became more active in this area and initiated a consultation to evaluate the possibilities and challenges to developing relations between republican exprisoner groups and victim/survivor groups (see enclosed). Coiste regards such work as integral to the ongoing contribution that former republican prisoners can make to peacebuild ing and the construction of a new, just, peaceful, and shared society on this island.

Following from the Good Friday Agreement the terminology of "vict ims groups" and "ex-prisoner group" was replicated in funding structures. Unfortunately this suggests an artificial dichotomy between the two groupings. Following on previous work which contested the marginal ization in the victims sector of republicans and the broader nationalist community, Coiste contends that a holistic approach to victims and victimization is required.

A full understanding of the causes, costs, and c onsequences of victims and victimization, and their implications for justice, truth, and reconciliation requires a holistic approach encompassing several issues:

- A dimensional definition of victims which extends to t he concept of victimization, defined as oppression, a lack of human rights and deh umanization.
- The recognition that different types of violence political, economic and social coexist and overlap on fi ve different levels individual, interpersonal, commu nal, institutional, and structural. By extension poverty, inequal ities and exclusion erode levels of physical, human, communal, and social capital.
- The historical, social, cultural, and economic antecedents to conflict must be taken into account as the context within which victims and victimization occurs.
- A broad conce ptualization of victimization, human rights, and human security takes into account the macro and micro levels, the public and private, the material and the psycho-emotional, and shifts responsibility beyond being solely that of individual and collective entities, to recognize the responsibility of the State.

• Recognition of the cr itical importance of identity — individuals are often perce ived simply as 'vict ims of the confl ict', result ing in an over emphasis on welfare rather than capacity building. Coiste supports f unding schemes which shift from a focus on short-term aid to sup port which priorit izes the longer-term deve lopment of individuals and their communities. Such a commitment is deemed essential to create an environment where social relations, networks, and intergenerat ional support structures can be rebuilt in families and communities.
