## O'Loan to meet the family of man scap executed

The Police Ombudsman has been asked to investigate how a newspaper knew Martin McGuinness was to be interviewed about the murder of an IRA man 15 years ago.

British Irish Rights Watch has written to Nuala O'Loan to complain about the disclosure of sensitive information about the PSNI's investigation into the death of former IRA man Eoin Morley in 1990.

Detectives from the Force's C2 investigations branch arrested former Army agent 'Kevin Fulton' at his London home in November and questioned him about Morley's murder after an account of the killing was published in his book, *Unsung Hero*.

The former soldier, who was infiltrated into the IRA in Newry, was released without charge.






Last week, a national newspaper reported details of police interviews with Fulton and his solicitor and stated that McGuinness (main picture) would also be questioned.

British Irish Rights Watch director Jane Winter has asked Mrs O'Loan to investigate the leaking of details of the police investigation.

She claims the report has placed Fulton's life at even greater risk.

She said: "If police officers have acted improperly and thereby put his (Fulton's) life at additional risk, I hope that a prompt investigation will help to put a stop to such activity."

A Police Ombudsman's spokesman said the British Irish Rights Watch request was being considered. The PSNI declined to comment.
