Wilson's Anti-Ulster Speech

SO Harold Wilson has laid it on the line. This 'brave' little politician who is as much despised by his fellow Socialists in England, as he is by the Loyalists of Ulster, decided last Saturday to speak in his constituency about the Ulster Problem. And, what did he say? In keeping with the sympathies of his foreign Irish voters, he considered it imprudent to mention the gross atrocities perpetrated by the enemies of the United Kingdom, so instead, he made a follow-up speech to Heath's "not-a-penny" warning to Ulster.

According to Wilson, "The situation in Northern Ireland is rapidly becoming intolerable." Surely he must realise that for a long time now the situation has been intolerable from a Loyalist point of view. We, who have worked so hard and for so long to build a forward-looking, enterprising state, have watched all our efforts being blasted to the ground, because Governments at home and at Westminster were frightened by the anti-Loyalist propaganda being spewed out by the mass media against the law-abiding majority in the Province. No other country in the world would have permitted known gangsters to organise themselves in such a way as to hold their country to ransom. But it was allowed to happen in Ulster.

Mr. Wilson condemns the 'blackmail' of the Ulster Defence Association which got the local government elections postponed while ignoring the intimidation of the Civil

Rights Movement, the S. D. L. P., and the People's Democracy, the Internees and other equally disreputable bodies. He also ignored the fact that the so-called British standards of election procedure which the mischievous opposition demanded at the very outset of our troubles have been carefully set aside even though the majority of Ulster people are opposed to P.R.

Wilson and his merry band shout for majority rule in Rhodesia while behind-the-scenes they are striving to achieve minority rule in Ulster. What hypocrites they are. What fools they are to think that they will succeed.
