## DEAFT MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY OF STATE

I send my best wishes to all men and women in the RUC and in the Armed Forces and their civilian support organisations, serving in Northern Ireland this Christmas. I want you to know of my gratitude for the job that you have done this year - a year which promises much for the future of Northern Ireland - and that you continue to do so very well.

I know that this gratitude is deeply felt by all in the Government, by the country as a whole and, particularly by the people of Northern Ireland itself who are now seeing, for the first time in many years, hope for the future. That hope has been made possible by the unstinting efforts of every member of the Royal Ulster Constabulary, of the Royal Ulster Constabulary Reserve, of the Regular Army and the Home Service Battalions of the Royal Irish Regiment, of the Royal Navy and the Royal Air Force and their civilian staffs who have, day in and day out, carried out their duty professionally and without complaint. 1994 has brought its own tragedies.
