

Thank you for your letter of 3 September about a number of constitutional points relating to the Coronation Oath.

The Coronation Oath is indeed regarded as a solemn undertaking by the Sovereign which is binding throughout Her reign. Ministers would not advise Her Majesty to sign into law any provision which contradicted Her Oath.

The Coronation Oath and the Accession Declaration Act are important features of our constitution and I would wish them to remain so. But as you know, the form of the Oath has changed previously in our history, and I could not bind a future Parliament.

- 2. Would you confirm that Her Majesty the Queen cannot in law break her Oath by signing any legislation that is contrary to the said Oath?
- 3. Would you confirm that the Coronation Oath and the Accession Act are fundamental to the Constitution of this United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland?

The people of this United Kingdom are surely entitled to know the Government's view on this most important constitutional matter.
